This manual provides adult participants, and parents of youth participants, with the information necessary for the lead up to and arrival at Revolution 2014.

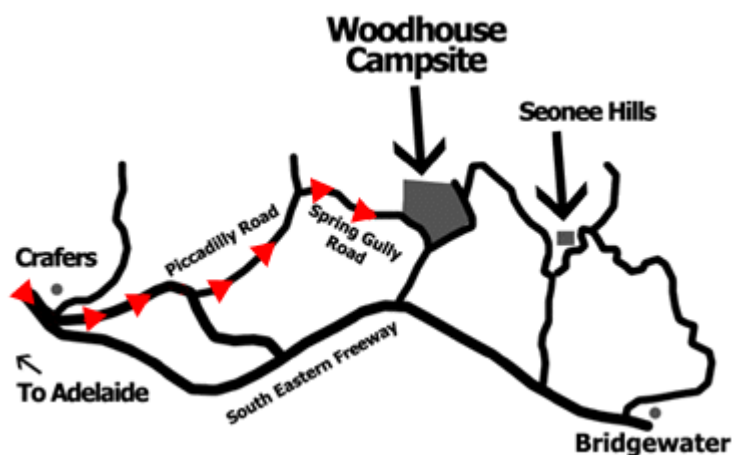
Please remember that there are two imperatives for Revolution 2014:

1. We aim for all participants to enjoy a safe event.
2. That all participants have an enjoyable and memorable activity and that they have **FUN!**

WOODHOUSE ACTIVITY CENTRE

Location

Woodhouse Activity Centre is located on 54 hectares of undulating gum tree studded countryside in the stunning Piccadilly Valley. Just 25 minutes from the Adelaide GPO, Woodhouse features numerous outdoor unpowered camping areas with access to adjacent shower and toilet blocks ("ASUs"), undercover BBQ facilities and campfire areas.

Getting there

1. Take the Crafers Exit from the South Eastern Freeway.
2. Continue through Crafers and veer left onto Piccadilly Road.
3. Turn left at the roundabout near the War Memorial.
4. And then turn right onto Spring Gully Road. Woodhouse is approx. 1km down on your left hand side.

Arrival time

Cubs and Joeys (and parents) will move in on the evening of **Friday 28 March** from **5.00pm** and until **9.00pm**, however some Sub-Camps may have different arrangements. **Please check with your own Group for local arrangements** to ensure that there is somebody there to sign in the



participant/s. See the [Parking](#) section below for important further information regarding parking arrangements.

Emergency contact for campers

In the event of an emergency, parents should contact the Leader in charge of their child at Revolution 2014 in the first instance (check with your Group).

There will be limited communications into the camp. The phone number below should be used **for only the most vital of information for participants.**

Climate

Criteria	March
Average Temp	High – 25°C Low – 11°C
Average Rainfall	30mm
Ave Sunrise	7.25AM
Ave Sunset	7.15PM

Overnight lows are felt more significantly whilst camping in tents, therefore warm overnight sleeping equipment is recommended.

Relatively early sunsets at this time of year mean that participants will require torches in their tents to get to/from ablution blocks at night.

The location of Woodhouse is in one of South Australia's higher rainfall areas, therefore packing a raincoat is recommended.

Severe Weather

The Revolution Committee will be monitoring the weather and fire ratings (via BoM and CFS) in the lead-up and during the event. In the unlikely event that extreme weather is declared for the dates of Revolution 2014, the event will not be held at that time and further advice will be issued.

GENERAL CAMP RULES

Youth Members

Water

In March the temperatures can fluctuate at Woodhouse. It can be very hot, although there have been wet days during this time of year as well.

Attendees are to carry a water bottle at all times and all participants should regularly have a drink. There will be a number of water points around the sites and at the activities. Please make sure that water bottles are clearly named.

Sunburn / Hats

All attendees of Revolution 2014 should have appropriate protection from sunburn.

Wide brimmed hats and sunscreen (SPF 30+) should be worn at all times during the day. **Baseball caps and sun visors are not to be worn.** Wide brimmed hats, the traditional felt Scout hat or wide brimmed “bucket” / bush hats are to be worn. Children without appropriate headwear will not be allowed to participate in activities with sun exposure. Please ensure that hats are clearly named.

Out of Bounds Areas/ Leaving Camp Site

Youth campers are not to leave the boundaries of the Camp, as detailed in the safety brief to be delivered on arrival. Campers may only leave the camp area after notifying their Sub-Camp Manager/ Leader.

Joey Scouts are the responsibility of their Parent/Caregiver during the entire event.

Youth members may only leave the site when accompanied by a responsible, authorised adult. Everyone leaving the Revolution 2014 site must go to Revolution HQ (in the Old House) to sign out and on return sign in.

Right to Privacy

All participants are reminded that everyone has a right to personal privacy. People may not enter other people's tents or touch other people's belongings.

All our youth members have the right to enjoy their privacy during changing and ablutions. Supervision must therefore be a careful balance of the individual's rights and those of ensuring the safety of all.

Photography

As per Scouting regulations, adults taking photographs should ensure that any photos uploaded to social media are not tagged.

Adults

Rest for Leaders

It is important to remember that Line Leaders should be rested during the course of Revolution 2014. There are sufficient leaders, parents and helpers to ensure that no adult should suffer from heat stroke, dehydration or over-exertion during the course of the event. Feel free to take a break or utilise the services of the 'Listening Ear' (Welfare) in the Environment Hut.

Alcohol

The Revolution 2014 site is a zero alcohol site as per Scouts Australia (SA Branch) policy. No tolerance will be given for anyone bringing alcohol onto the site.

Smoking

Smoking is only to occur in the designated area within your child's Sub-Camp. There will be no smoking areas outside of this. These smoking areas will be clearly defined out of the sight of youth members and away from food and tents. No Smoking will be allowed anywhere else on the property."

A reminder that Joey Scouts are the responsibility of their Parent/Caregiver during the entire event.

All butts are to be extinguished and disposed of in a metal can etc, to prevent the risk of a grass fire. Remember – out of sight of the youth members. *Be aware that Woodhouse is very dry in March and during this period no open fires are permitted at Woodhouse.*

Camp Administration/Security

All Revolution 2014 registered participants will be issued an identification pass on a lanyard which must be worn at all times.

ALL visitors who have not previously been issued with a pass **MUST** report to Revolution HQ (in the Old House) to register as being on-site and receive a visitor pass. Everyone on-site **MUST** be wearing a pass at all times. If a person does not have a pass on they will be challenged, and may be asked to leave the campsite. We need to know who is on site at all times.

When the visitor is ready to leave the campsite, they **MUST** advise the leader of that Sub-Camp that they are leaving before returning to administration to sign out and return the visitor pass. Passes are **NOT** to be transferred to another person. Joey Parents who change the parent attending must report to Revolution HQ to have their pass and details updated.

To appropriately secure the site all gates into Woodhouse (including the exit gate) will be secured after the entry and exit phase.

People needing to either come onto the site or to exit the site during this period will be able to access the gate by calling the gate mobile number (0455 044 279). A Police Scouter member will open the gate for them.

Camp discipline

Please be assured that Cubs and Joeys will be treated in the same way that they are at all scouting activities.

However, should a Cub or Joey Scout behave in such a way that they cannot be managed at the team camp; the following process will be implemented:

- Youth members will be referred to Sub-Camp Management team.
- Sub-Camp Management team may refer the youth member/s to the Listening Ear.
- Where necessary, parents/guardians will be contacted.
- If all efforts to counsel the youth member/s are unsuccessful, parents/guardians will be required to make ***arrangements to leave the event.***

Camp routine

Revolution 2014 will officially start for participants after registration at the Sub-Camps. See schedule at [Appendix B](#).

- Cubs and Joeys will attend activity bases each morning and afternoon.
- Breakfast, lunch, dinner and supper will be served at each Sub-Camp.
- Morning and afternoon tea will be taken to the Joeys/Cubs each day (or packed in day packs) and consumed at the activity bases.
- On Saturday night there will be evening entertainment on the Revolution 2014 stage, subject to weather.
- Joeys/Cubs will rise at a time ready for breakfast in accordance with the schedule, and lights-out will no later than 10.00pm.

Water will be available at all times and all participants should drink regularly. Water bottles belonging to Joeys and Cubs will be regularly checked by Line Leaders/Parents/Adult helpers.

Gear/kit list for youth members attending

Attached at [Appendix D](#) is a suggested kit list in an easy-to-use checklist format which Revolution attendees might find useful. Sub-Camps or Groups may choose to provide customised Gear Lists.

Lost property

All items that are to be brought to the event must be marked with the participant's name. Each Sub-Camp will have a collection point for lost property. Please remember to check this regularly and at close of the event. Any remaining lost property will be disposed of at the discretion of each Sub-Camp Manager at the conclusion of the event.

SPECIAL NOTE: CLIMBING WALL ACTIVITY

The Climbing Wall activity is noteworthy due to its popularity and the numbers of youth members that will be completing the activity within a small timeframe.

Due to the tight time constraints for rotating many children through the activities, it is imperative that all adults assist and support the Activity Leaders at the Climbing Wall site so that all the Joeys and Cubs get a turn. Adults that are not leaders will need to follow the directions of leaders to support them in this.

SOUVENIRS AND MERCHANDISE

A range of souvenirs will be available for sale at Revolution 2014, including collector items from previous major Scouting events.

Orders will be taken for Revolution 2014 souvenir items: hats (adult/child), teddy bears, towels. Order forms will be available before and during the event. In addition to the items available for purchase, participants will receive items during Revolution 2014 that will be valued souvenirs of the event.

The Scout Outdoor Centre will be attending on Saturday 29 March with a great range of equipment for sale. They will be situated in the Round House (near the Bunkhouse).

OCCUPATION OF CAMPSITE

Vehicle Access

No participant vehicles will be allowed on site after **Friday 28 March at 4.30pm**. It is a long walk from the outside car parks to some of the camping sites. Some Sub-Camps may provide a trailer "luggage pickup" service. Participants should contact their Group to determine the arrangements for luggage.

Revolution 2014 finishes at **2:00pm on Sunday 30 March**. Vehicles will be allowed to re-enter the inner facility once the youth participants have left the site.

Parking

Cubs and Joeys (and parents) will move in on the evening of **Friday 28 March** from **5.00pm** and until **9.00pm**, however some Sub-Camps may have different arrangements. **Please check with your own Group for local arrangements** to ensure that there is somebody there to sign in the participant/s.

Attendees should note that parking is limited. **Car pooling should be considered and actively encouraged wherever possible**. There will be a designated Joey car park and a designated Cub car park. Details of how these function are as follows:

Joey Car Park

For Joey Scouts and their parent/caregivers attending the event. Once parked, these vehicles should remain in the car park for the entire event.

Parents who have a mixture of Joey/s and Cub/s, and/or the vehicle is staying at the event, should park in the Joey car park and display the letter "J" as provided in [Appendix C](#).

Vehicles that will be parking in this car park should print and display the letter "J" as provided in Appendix C. This will help Police Scouters direct the traffic accordingly.

Gates to this car park will close on the Friday night at 9:30pm. People needing to either come into or to exit this car park during this period will be able to access the

gate by calling the gate mobile number (0455 044 279). A Police Scouter member will open the gate for them. The Cub car park gates will be open during the entire event and people requiring to continually move vehicles on and off site should park in the Cub car park.

Cub Car Park

People should park their vehicles in the Cub car park if:

- they are escorting Cubs to the event, or
- they will be dropping off participants and then leaving immediately, or
- the vehicle will need to be continually moved on- and off-site during the event.

Parents who have a mixture of Joey/s and Cub/s, and/or the vehicle is staying at the event, should park in the Joey car park and display the letter "J" as provided in [Appendix C](#).

Once parked, parents should escort their Cub/s to the Sub-Camp along with their gear (please see below regarding luggage). **Please limit your stay in this car park to a minimum, as car parking space is at a premium.**

Vehicles that will be parking in this car park should print and display the letter "C" as provided in Appendix C. This will help Police Scouters direct the traffic accordingly.

Luggage

All items that are to be brought to the event must be marked with the participant's name.

Participants should contact with their Group to determine the arrangements for luggage.

Individual food/snacks must not be brought to camp or stored in luggage/tents during the camp as it will attract pests and insects.

Arrival of attendees

Cubs and Joeys will move in on the evening of **Friday 28 March** between **5.00pm and 9.00pm**. The activities commence the following morning. Arrival outside of these times will be by arrangement with Sub-Camp Managers.

All attendees of Revolution 2014 should have had an evening meal before arrival on Friday evening, or bring a packed meal. Some Groups/Sub-Camps will cater a light supper on Friday evening, please check with your Group as to specific arrangements for you.

Opening Ceremony commences at 8.30am on Saturday 29 March.

FIRST AID/SPECIAL ARRANGEMENTS

Provision of First Aid

Qualified on-site first aid personnel will be provided to Revolution 2014 by St John Ambulance. All Sub-Camps and activity centres will also have first aid kits and first aid trained Scout Leaders on-site.

Up to date medical/special needs information

Up-to-date and complete health information is required for each registered attendee (adult and child).

The registration system is permanently online and any special arrangements may be added to a member's registration record at any time leading up to the event. **Any change of circumstances since registration** should be sent by email to both the youth's Leader and revolution2014@sa.scouts.com.au, and an information copy should be sent with the responsible adult escorting the camper to the event.

Medicines

All medication brought to Revolution 2014 is to be in a clean, sealed container (zip-lock bag) clearly labelled with the patient's name, conditions and timings for consumption of the medication. Note that all medications must be held securely.

Joey parents are to have responsibility of the carrying/administration of their own Joey Scout's medication.

Medications for Cubs should be labelled/sealed as above and given to the Line Leaders/Pack leader.

Joeys/Cubs should retain Asthma puffers if parents consider them qualified to operate.

Welfare

There will be a Welfare office called the "Listening Ear" where non-medical issues may be addressed, such as homesickness or other matters that mean a child just needs some time away from the activities of the event. Youth who attend the "Listening Ear" must make sure that their Leader or Parent knows of their whereabouts.

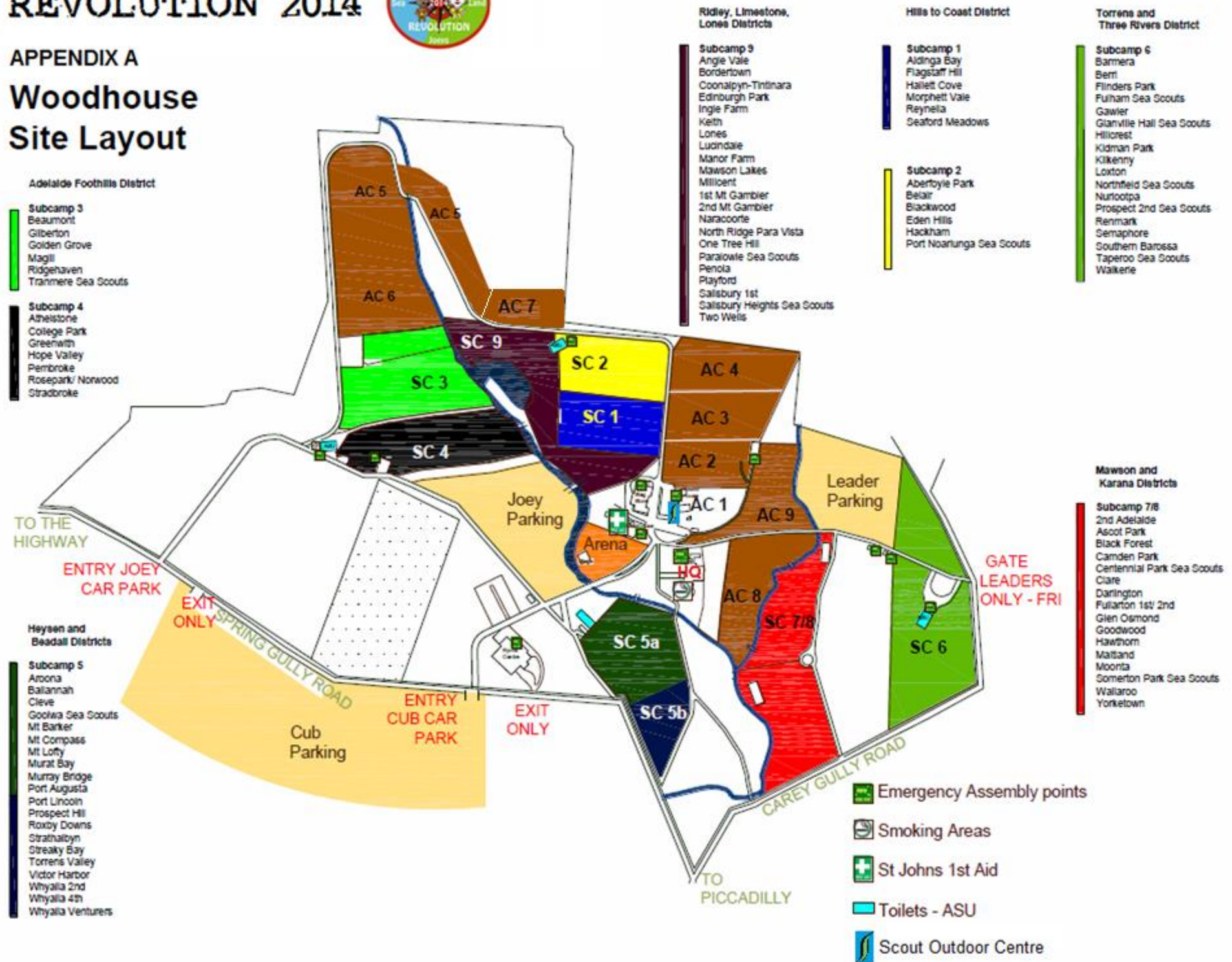
